Noon Lunch Supervision Fees

For the 2023-24 school year, a per-student noon lunch supervision fee will be charged for students who attend Saskatoon elementary schools and stay at school over the lunch period. This cost-recovery fee will help cover the expense of supervision that is not funded by provincial operating grants. The fee was introduced in 2022-23 because the division is no longer able to absorb this expense.

For elementary schools in Saskatoon, the cost-recovery fee applies to kindergarten through Grade 8 students who stay at school for lunch. The fee will be \$10 per month per student. Half-time kindergarten students will pay \$5 per month. Fees will be capped at \$20 per month per family. (High school fees are separate and not included in this per-family cap.) Families have the option to make one payment for the entire school year (10 months; September through June) or set-up monthly installments. **Initial payment was due September 28, 2023.** When making the purchase, please select the number of the months you're paying for (10 quantity for the entire school year).

The fee will apply to all students who stay at the school over lunch, including students who are bused to school. Fees are fixed per month; they will not be calculated based on the number of school days or the number of days students are present/absent. Fees help recover the cost of supervision; they do not pay for food. These fees also apply for children that go home at lunch but return early during the lunch break.

Fees can be paid online through MySchoolBucks (<u>www.myschoolbucks.ca</u>) using credit cards or VISA/MasterCard debit cards. Receipts can be issued and the cost can be claimed as a childcare deduction on your federal tax return.

To allow equitable access for families, fees will be waived for families unable to pay. If this applies to you, please create a MySchoolBucks account and continue to the area to pay fees. Select the "request exemption" option instead of a payment amount. This request will be kept confidential and only viewed by the school office.

Instructions to create an account, login, and pay fees through MySchoolBucks can be found on the division website at <u>https://go.gscs.ca/nls</u>. Answers to some frequently asked questions are also on the website.

FirstStudent bus company has a new app called FirstView. This app allows you to register your stop and track the location of the bus which will be especially helpful when the weather turns cold. The inspiration for the campaign came to co-founders Paul Lacerte and his daughter Raven in 2011 during a moose hunt on their traditional Carrier territory along the Highway of Tears in Northern BC – where so many women have gone missing or been murdered. Since then, annual gatherings and ceremonial fasts have taken place and more than two million squares of moose hide have been distributed in thousands of participating communities, schools, and organizations across the country.

As the campaign spreads across Canada and internationally, we have a vision of one million people fasting together in ceremony to end violence against women and children.

People of all ages, genders and cultures are invited to participate in our campaign actions.

TRANSFORMING ORGANIZATIONS AND COMMUNITIES Communities and organizations across Canada are embracing the Moose Hide Campaign. They are part of a growing network of inspired citizens answering the call to put an end to wide-spread domestic and gender-based violence once and for all. The campaign has spread across all levels of government, police forces, Indigenous communities, the not-for-profit sector, K-12 schools and post-secondary institutions – and many others are taking it up to create safer spaces and support reconciliation. It's an Indigenous innovation for the benefit of all Canadians.

RECONCILIATION IN ACTION Moose Hide Campaign gatherings are opportunities for experiential learning and reconciliation. Participating in the campaign is a practical way for individuals and organizations to take action on the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada Calls to Action and the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls Calls for Justice.
