**IFBH** Life Threatening Conditions

# **Statement of Policy**

Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools recognizes that students may have medical conditions that could potentially become life-threatening while they are attending school and school activities.

#### Rationale

Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools is committed to the creation of a safe and healthy physical environment for students with life-threatening conditions. We want to minimize the risk of exposure of students with life-threatening conditions by working collaboratively with parents, school team, and health care providers.

# **Authority**

> The Education Act, Sections 85, 175, 190

#### **Definitions**

- 1. Anaphylaxis is a sudden and severe allergic reaction, which can be fatal and requires immediate medical emergency measures be taken.
- 2. Asthma is a chronic, inflammatory disease of the airways in the lungs.
- 3. Diabetes is a chronic disease, in which the body either cannot produce insulin or cannot properly use the insulin it produces.
- 4. Epilepsy is a neurological condition which affects the nervous system.

#### **Procedures/Guidelines**

- 1. When a student registers with a potential life-threatening medical conditions, the principal will ensure:
  - a. Parents/guardians have a Medical Form completed by their physician to support the development of an Emergency Action Plan specific to the life-threatening condition at school and on the bus if required.
  - b. School team, in consultation with the parents/guardians and physician, prepares a written Emergency Action Plan.
  - c. Request permission to share, post and/or distribute photographs and Emergency Action Plan in key locations in the school so all staff is aware.
  - d. Designated staff are sufficiently trained to carry out the Emergency Action Plan.
  - e. Store the completed Medical Form and all correspondence from the parent/guardian and physician in the student's cumulative record file.
  - f. Proper storage of the medication and/or health care supplies required.
  - g. Arrange on a yearly basis, an information in-service/professional development to all school staff regarding the Emergency Action Plan and its implementation.

- h. Arrange on a yearly basis, for all school staff to receive professional development on the symptoms of anaphylaxis, risk reduction and how to use an auto-injector in an emergency through the Food Allergy Canada online course.
- i. Emergency Action Plan is reviewed and updated at the beginning of each school year by parents/guardians and school team.
- 2. Parents/Guardians must:
  - a. Inform the school in writing, of any changes in health conditions, treatment method and/or emergency plan required for their child.
  - b. Provide the necessary medication and health care supplies for the student during the school day and while participating in school activities.
- 3. Students are strongly encouraged to wear medical alert identification at all times.
