#### 6.1 Catholic Education Week

- The Chair confirmed Catholic Education week as May 10 to 17, 2026, and asked Superintendent of Learning, T. Hickey and Coordinator of Religious Services, D. Lich, to present.
- D. Lich shared the plans for Catholic Education Week, including the purpose and intent of this week, as to strengthen the Catholic dimension of our school division, as we support the faith journey of each individual. The theme for this year is: Catholic Education Pilgrims of Hope – On the Path to Holiness.
- Catholic Education Week is a meaningful opportunity to highlight and celebrate the distinctiveness of Catholic education across Saskatchewan's eight publicly funded Catholic school divisions; the sub-theme of each day of the week was explained in detail. Both diocesan and division level materials have been developed and provided.
- Trustees asked questions on the level of integration of clergy in schools during this week. Responses explained that this varies by school and the availability of the pastors to join.
- Based on discussions, suggested was to request the schools to provide to the board a list their activities and events held during Catholic Education week. The board may then choose to share this back to the diocese/parishes to let them know the activities that occurred as well as to thank them for promoting Catholic Education week.

## 6.2 Preventative Maintenance & Renewal (PMR) – Four Year Plan Approval

- The Chair called for Superintendent of Facility Services, R. Martin, to present on the four year plan for Preventative Maintenance and Renewal (PMR).
- The PMR funding received as part of the 2026-2027 provincial budget was noted as the same amount received in the 2025-2026 provincial budget.
- PMR funding allows the board to take a strategic approach to on-going maintenance and replacement of school building components.
- The four-year PMR plan requiring board approval and submission to the Ministry of Education prior to proceeding with the planned PMR projects was reviewed in detail.
- Highlighted were the two changes implemented in this program that took effect last year, being that new schools will not receive PMR funds as new schools require less maintenance dollars. The risks this presents were noted and discussed.
- The other matter noted pertains to how the Ministry is valuing capital projects. Discussions with the Ministry are ongoing.
- Following the presentation the Chair called for any further comments or questions on four year PMR plans. None were noted.

## 6.3 St. Joseph High School Conservation Easement Agreement – Meewasin Valley Authority

- The Chair called for Deputy Director / Chief Financial Officer, J. Lloyd to present.
- The St. Joseph High School Conservation Easement Agreement between Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools and the Meewasin Valley Authority (Meewasin), as signed February 2001, created a perpetual conservation easement agreement between the school division and Meewasin to protect a 2.87-hectare naturalized area surrounding St. Joseph High School.
- Since 2001, significant changes in and to the area have occurred and given that the agreement has not been updated to reflect the changes, discussions with Meewasin have resulted in mutual agreement to amend the agreement to include a updates such as a termination clause, if the board approves to do so.
- Explanations were provided on GSCS's intent to maintain the conservation area by administration.
- The Chair noted with appreciation the positive and productive conversations held with Meewasin, and the good relationship that has been maintained.

Motion: Moved by Trustees S. Zakreski-Werbicki and G. Yousif that the Board of Education approve the termination of the Conservation Easement Agreement with Meewasin Valley Authority.

#### 6.4 At Large and Ward Electoral System Review

- The Chair opened the agenda item for the review of the at-large versus wards electoral system review, with appreciation for the length and breadth of materials, historic and current, provided to the board.
- Director of Education, F. Rivard, provided a high-level review of the decisions and information resulting from the forty-year deep dive into GSCS's electoral system history.
- Highlighted were the two letters received from Bishop M. Hagemoen and Bishop M. Smolinski, and that both are interested in meeting should further clarity on their perspectives be of value to the board.
- Noted with importance was the information received from the Ministry and the City of Saskatoon regarding the complexities to be considered should the board consider changes to the electoral system currently in use.
- Confirmation was provided that legal counsel from the Saskatchewan School Boards Association has no concerns with either at-large or ward electoral systems.
- As duly moved, by Trustee T. Jelinski and seconded by Trustee K. Day, the Chair called for discussion on the motion put forward.
- Further details were asked and responses were provided on the history of Saskatoon Catholic Schools adding Humboldt, Biggar and Martensville. Feedback noted that the boards at that time who agreed to amalgamation may have agreed with certain expectations to be considered and upheld.
- Trustees reviewed the potential impacts and risks that a change in the electoral system would have with our amalgamated schools.
- Remarks shared by some trustees, based on the materials, noted aspects that would be onerous and time consuming yet needed in order to change the electoral system, which some felt may not realistically achieve deeper engagement with those who have elected the board.
- Others expressed that the at-large current system provides representation only from a few areas of the city and not the entire city. In comparison, some expressed the ward system evidences fairness and representation of the whole.
- One issue with the current system of sub-divisions is the imbalance in the number of votes it takes to get elected, considering the number of voters and populations in our greater Saskatoon areas. A ward system would bring those subdivision voters into wards within the City of Saskatoon which would result in a balanced election process.
- Other remarks focused more broadly, noting that all perspectives of the electoral process need to be considered, being diocesan, political and community.
- From the voting public, those who do not have students in our schools also need to have a voice.
- The Chair shared the perspective of Trustee B. Elliott, who had emailed her thoughts on the matter.
- Agreement was noted that discussions with the Bishops would provide clarity to their perspectives, should this be needed.

- Discussions included the acclamation process, when only one candidate is nominated and then assumes the role. Some felt this lack of competition for a seat may reflect a lack of engagement by the electorate. Others felt the ward system would be a benefit as it may encourage more citizens to consider running for election.
- Some felt strongly that given that there was 23 candidates who ran in the past election, this indicates the at-large system is not effective. The ward system would allow for more direct engagement with a specific group of the electorate. Therefore, those voices, positions and questions could be more directly addressed. Our school division is growing and we need to embrace the opportunity for greater community involvement.
- Discussions included what takes place when no one runs in a given ward.
- Upon conclusion of the discussions, hearing no further comments or questions, the Chair gave thanks to all for their perspectives and contributions. Through the good efforts of the Director of Education, we have maintained our positive relationships with the diocese, board and our community. It is important to consider how we as a board might improve engagement with our electorate after such a period of growth as our school division has experienced.
- Trustee O. Fortosky requested a recorded vote on the motion.
- Trustee T. Jelinski read aloud the motion on the table, that the board directs administration to prepare for the 2028 trustee election using the current at-large electoral system that includes the three subdivisions.
- The vote was conducted and recorded as:
  - In favour (7): Trustees D. Boyko, T. Jelinski, M. Christopher, K. Day, F. Possberg, M. Raney and S. Zakreski-Werbicki.
  - Opposed (1): Trustee O. Fortosky
  - Abstained (1): Trustee G. Yousif
  - CARRIED

## **8.0 Reports and Good News**

### **8.1 Report of the Director of Education**

- The report provided and presented by the Director of Education, F. Rivard, included highlights from events since the previous board meeting report. The director noted May and June as exceptionally busy times for the board and administration, with many events that benefit from GSCS representation. Great appreciation was given to trustees for their presence in our schools as well. The good work of the trustees is noticed.
- Highlighted events were the Understanding Your Faith teaching mass, presided over by Father D. Tumback, and for C. Doepker, Religious Education Consultant, Latin Rite, who has led the cohort of 140 teacher this year. Other notable events were the Teen Aid Fundraiser and Faces of the Holocaust. Our partners clearly appreciate how GSCS leadership is present at various events.

### **8.6 Committee/Partnership Reports**

- The Chair called for the reports from our committees and partnerships, for those committees who have met since the previous reporting period.
  - Joint Operations – Trustees F. Possberg and T. Jelinski:
    - Trustee F. Possberg reminded everyone of the Humboldt Collegiate Institute graduation exercises taking place on June 12, 2026 in Humbolt.
    - The Joint Operations Committee meeting with the Horizon school division noted that enrolment continues to grow slowly and that the budget review did not raise any concern.
    - A funeral was held for teacher Heather Stomp at St. Augustine Church in Humboldt. The response and supports from the school division and community were greatly appreciated.
    - The Chair explained that we have a tragic response team and Superintendent of Learning Services J. Vangool, provided further explanation of the teams and services provided in response to tragic events.

- Together in Faith and Action – Trustees S. Zakreski-Werbicki and M. Christopher
  - Trustee S. Zakreski-Werbicki reviewed the discussions at the meeting, noting Catholic education week; USask St. Thomas More (STM) discussion opportunities for new classes for our teachers regarding Understanding Our Faith; an update from Catholic Education Coordinators Association of Saskatchewan (CECAS); the subcommittees work on Adult Faith Formation for staff of the service centre and board office, which has been running for four weeks currently; and the Byzantine program BLAZE for high school and junior BLAZE for elementary. The book, “New Roots: Stories of Resilience and Hope”, as compiled and edited by Dr. Viktoriia Marko, GSCS staff member, was noted and applauded for bringing to life the imprints from the war in the Ukraine.
  - Trustee M. Christopher expanded on the resources created by C. Doepker, as of great importance and easily accessible for our schools through the website, with activities and lessons for all. Currently, students of St. Thomas More College (STM) do not have a way to major in Catholic Studies. Discussions are ongoing to have more Catholic studies classes, and a certificate program to help teachers to form their faith before they are hired as teacher. Remarks noted representation at the USask College of Education is needed.
  - The Chair added information regarding the program offered through the partnership with Newman Theological College, based out of Edmonton, Alberta.
  
- Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools Foundation – Trustees B. Elliott and T. Jelinski
  - Nothing to report at this time. Next meeting date is June 16, 2026.
  
- māmawohkamātowin Partnership (Saskatoon Tribal Council) – Chair D. Boyko and Trustees T. Jelinski and M. Raney
  - The review by trustees attending the meeting highlighted the work being done towards a self-declaration document for Métis people, in collaboration with the Métis Nation of Saskatchewan.
  
- nākatēyimitowin Educational Partnership (CUMFI) – Chair D. Boyko and Trustees K. Day and S. Zakreski-Werbicki
  - Nothing to report at this time. Next meeting date is pending reschedule.
  
- Division Committee on Reconciliation and Healing – Chair D. Boyko and Trustee K. Day
  - Nothing to report at this time. Next meeting date is May 13, 2026.
  
- Columbus Bosco Homes – Trustee O. Fortosky
  - Trustee O. Fortosky noted the Joe Kammermayer fundraising dinner with appreciation to the speaker from the Parent and Tot Program, a mother who shared her experience. The success of the cake auction was remarkable once again.
  - Reference was made to the work in Malawi, which located in Southeaster Africa, and connected through the diocese. The work being done to connect

teachers with GSCS resources and curriculum allows us to partner our teachers and schools with that community. Still lots of challenges with access but this important work is ongoing.

#### Saskatchewan Catholic School Boards Association (SCSBA)

- The notes from Trustee B. Elliott were shared.
- F. Rivard noted added updates on the SCSBA 2026 AGM and Convention that GSCS is hosting in October 2026. CECAS will be invited to attend, and trustees are welcome to invite any others to the speaker sessions that have been planned.

#### Saskatchewan School Boards Association (SSBA)

- Noted was the upcoming regional SSBA meeting sessions to be held in Saskatoon on May 29<sup>th</sup>. The Chair confirmed those attending.

#### Other Events:

- Trustee K. Day noted the awesome St. Mary's pep rally attended.
- Trustee S. Zakreski-Werbicki noted the LIT Up! Foundations of Learning fundraiser attended.
- Trustees mentioned recent school-based visits.
- Chair D. Boyko noted the beautiful celebration of life for C. Bender, as arranged by GSCS staff. A very beautiful service in the school gym and reminds us why we are a Catholic School division.
- Trustee S. Zakereski-Werbicki noted discussions at the St Luke Catholic School Community Council meeting, at which the school considered sharing their excess fundraising monies with schools who may benefit. Other trustees noted this as good to mention at CSCC meeting they attend.

4. The entire early learning intensive supports grant has been received for the year. Overall, revenue will be on budget.
5. The division received a payment from the Ministry of Education related to the Brighton elementary school construction project that was not in budget.
6. Most of the budgeted noon lunch supervision fee has been collected and interest revenues are projecting to be over budget. The gain on the sale of the St. Frances McPherson property was not budgeted.
7. The final invoice for the April byelection has not been received as of April 30. Governance will be over budget at year-end.
8. A higher proportion of school generated revenue is spent at the end of the school year than earlier.
9. Budgeted spending for materials and supplies has not been fully incurred as of April 30.

Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools (GSCS) provides daily transportation for 6,678 students. Rural students attending GSCS schools in Biggar, Humboldt, Warman, and Martensville are transported jointly with the public school divisions in those communities.

The following summarizes transportation services provided to students attending schools in Saskatoon, including one French immersion route to École Holy Mary elementary school.

The bargaining teams for CUPE Local 3730 and the Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools' Board of Education have achieved a Memorandum of Agreement for a Collective Agreement for the term September 1, 2025 to August 31, 2028.

Minor language changes and updates occurred, with a general wage increase and benefit adjustment of:

2025-2026: 2.5%

2026-2027: 3.0%

2027-2028: 3.0%

- Paramedical benefit maximum increase from \$250 to \$300.

CUPE Local 3730 held its ratification vote on May 30, 2026, with 90% of voting members in support.

### Recommendation:

***That the Board of Education ratify the Memorandum of Agreement achieved between Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools and CUPE Local 3730.***

## 2. Local 2268

The bargaining teams for CUPE Local 2268 and the Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools' Board of Education have achieved a Memorandum of Agreement for a Collective Agreement for the term September 1, 2025 to August 31, 2028.

Minor language changes and updates occurred, with a general wage increase of:

2025-2026: 2.5%

2026-2027: 3.0%

2027-2028: 2.5%

- Vision: Increase from \$300 to \$400, accessible every 24 months.
- Paramedical benefit maximum increase from \$250 to \$350.
- Orthodontics: Lifetime maximum for dependents increase from \$1,500 to \$2,000.
- Service recognition: After 30 years of service the employee will receive a payment equal to nine (9) weeks.
- Casual pay increase from 80% to 85% of Step 1 of respective classification.
- One time \$100 payment per current contract employee at the time of ratification.

CUPE Local 2268 have scheduled to hold its ratification vote on June 11-13, 2026.

On April 16, 2026, Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools, in partnership with Summit Engineering, issued a Request for Tender (RFT) for the St. Joseph High School Locker Room Ventilation Project.

The RFT was posted on SaskTenders to satisfy the requirements of the New West Trade Partnership Agreement and the Canadian Free Trade Agreement. The close date was April 30, 2026.

Three tender responses were received ranging from \$147,000 to \$221,000 plus GST and PST.

KIM Constructors Ltd. was provided with a Letter of Intent, subject to Board of Education approval, based on submitting the lowest tendered price that met all the bid document requirements.
